


Dr. Maya Angelou




Mary Church Terrell


Susan B. Anthony





Tennessee House Ratifies Federal Amendment Giving Women of Entire Nation Vote This Fall

NASHVILLE, Tenn., August 18 .- The women of the country will participate in the coming presidential election for the first time in history, as a result of the action of the house of representatives today, in voting to ratify the federal suffrage amendment. Tennessee is the 36th state to ratify the amendment, thus it now becomes the law of the land. The vote in the house was 49 to 47. The senate ratified the amendment last Friday, by a vote of 25 to 4.



1974

Until this year, women couldn't get credit cards on their own Banks could refuse women a credit card until the Equal Credit Opportunity Act of 1974 was signed into law.

Prior to that, a bank could refuse to issue a credit card to an unmarried woman, and if a woman was married, her husband was required to cosign.
